



Memorandum of Understanding

Objective: Reciprocal visit agreement

1. The Faculty of Law of the University of Cambridge (hereinafter "Cambridge Faculty") and Facultad de Derecho de la Universidad de la República (hereinafter "UDELAR-FDER") wish to establish a reciprocal visit agreement for teaching staff on undergraduate and postgraduate programmes.

Coordinator

2. Each institution will designate one person to act as coordinator of this exchange programme. The coordinator of the Cambridge Faculty will be the Director of International Strategy and Partnerships. The coordinator for the UDELAR-FDER will be the Coordinator of the Projects, Cooperation and Agreements Unit.

Number and duration of visits

3. It has been agreed that there will be visits by up to one member of academic staff from each institution to the other per calendar year. Visits to the Cambridge Faculty would ideally take place during the Michaelmas period (early October to early December) or the Lent period (mid-January to mid-March). Visits to the UDELAR-FDER would normally take place from early March to June and from early August to mid-November. The duration of the visits is planned for one week, with longer stays to be arranged by mutual agreement.

Accommodation agreements

4. A member of the academic staff of the receiving institution shall act as host for each visitor. The host institution shall make these arrangements in consultation with the visitor.
5. Where appropriate, visitors from the Cambridge Faculty and the UDELAR-FDER may be assigned to one of the host Faculty's research centres.

Visitor selection

6. The arrangements for the selection of visitors shall be determined by the sending institution. In the event that the number of requests for visits during the same calendar year exceeds the number mentioned in point 3, the coordinator of the receiving institution must be consulted. Both institutions also undertake to make every effort to host additional visitors outside the scope of this exchange.

Costs

- a. Travel expenses shall be covered by the visitor and, where appropriate, by the visitor's Institution (to be agreed in advance with the coordinator); and
- b. The reasonable accommodation costs of visitors for one week will be covered by the receiving institution. In the case where the visitor is accompanied, only the costs of

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the visitor (or equivalent) have to be covered. In case the visitor stays longer than one week, the additional costs shall be covered by the visitor.

Organisation of accommodation

7. Unless otherwise agreed, accommodation shall normally be arranged by the receiving institution. To this end, visitors shall communicate their accommodation needs well in advance of their visit, especially if they intend to be accompanied.

Visa and associated travel documents

8. Visitors are responsible for obtaining the necessary visa, comprehensive health insurance covering accidents and repatriation of remains and associated travel documentation if required. Each institution undertakes to provide a prospective visitor with the relevant supporting documentation, in particular a formal invitation for visa purposes.

Access to resources and workspace, etc.

9. Each institution shall grant visitors full access to the resources normally available to academic visitors, including the library during opening hours and online resources. Each institution shall also endeavour to provide a working space for the visitor.
10. Where appropriate, the visitor from both institutions may be invited to give a lecture in one of the established courses or an individual lecture open to the public.

Start and duration

11. Under this memorandum, teaching staff on undergraduate and postgraduate programmes from both institutions will be able to apply for a one-week visit. The agreement will continue in the first instance for two years, meaning that each institution will send and receive up to two visitors during that period. After the end of this first two-year period, the terms of this Memorandum of Understanding may be renewed by mutual agreement. If this agreement is discontinued for any reason during the first two-year period, the institutions agree to continue to provide the services set out in this memorandum to visitors already accepted or participating in the agreement.

Brand protection

12. Neither party shall use the name, trade name, trademark, logo or other designation of the other party in connection with any product, promotion, advertisement, press release or publicity without the prior written permission of the other party.




Nature of this Memorandum

13. The participating institutions do not intend to create legal relations through the execution of this memorandum and therefore it is not binding and has no legal effect. The institutions undertake to address any issues in this agreement in a collaborative and cooperative manner.



Disputes

14. In the event of any dispute arising between the Universities over the interpretation or application of this non-binding memorandum, the dispute shall be referred to the Chair of the Cambridge Faculty Board of Law and the Dean of the Faculty of Law of the University of the Republic, who shall attempt to resolve the matter in good faith.
